Before Farming: Learning from Nature

- Early humans collected fruits, seeds, roots and other edible plants.
- People noticed that seeds could grow into new plants.
- They observed where plants grew well—near water, in fertile soil and with suitable light.
- Knowledge developed through observation and experience.

The Beginning of Farming

- Around 10,000–12,000 years ago, people in different regions began domesticating plants.
- People started saving seeds and growing useful plants near their settlements.
- They selected plants with useful qualities such as larger seeds or better taste.
- Farming allowed communities to produce food more reliably.

Choosing a Place to Grow

- People looked for access to water, suitable soil and enough sunlight.
- River valleys became important farming regions because water and fertile sediments were available.
- Farmers learned which places and seasons worked best for different crops.
- There were no soil test kits—knowledge came from observation and experience.

Watering Plants Without Pumps

- Rain was the main water source, but people developed ways to move and store water.
- Channels and irrigation systems carried water from rivers and streams to fields.
- People used buckets, containers and water-lifting devices.
- Managing water became essential for successful farming.

Ancient Irrigation

- Civilizations in Mesopotamia, Egypt, China and the Indus region developed irrigation practices.
- Canals, wells, channels and reservoirs helped farmers manage water.
- Communities often worked together to build and maintain these systems.
- Growing plants involved both technology and cooperation.

Understanding Soil

- Farmers learned that different soils were better for different crops.
- They observed colour, texture, moisture and fertility.
- Animal manure and plant residues were used to improve soil.
- Practices such as crop rotation helped maintain productive land.

Growing Plants with Simple Tools

- Seeds were planted by hand using simple tools such as digging sticks and hoes.
- Local materials were used to make tools, baskets and containers.
- Knowledge about seeds, seasons, watering and harvesting was passed between generations.
- Careful observation of plants and weather was essential.

Traditional Knowledge Was Technology Too

- Technology does not always mean electronics or computers.
- A canal, irrigation pot, plough or farming calendar is also a human-made solution.
- People used available materials and knowledge to solve real problems.
- This helps us ask what we can design today with the tools we have.

From Past to Present

- Past: observation, experience, hand tools and simple irrigation.
- Later: improved farming tools, water systems, greenhouses and scientific study.
- Today: sensors, automated irrigation, controlled growing environments and data.
- The basic questions remain: What does the plant need? How much? When?

The Question for PlantTalk

- People in the past learned to care for plants by observing them closely.
- Today, sensors can help us measure conditions around a plant.
- Can we use technology to help a plant communicate its needs?
